Neighbourhood plans give communities direct power to shape growth in their local area in line with local priorities. They are based on community consultation and written by residents.

It is now up to everyone living in our parishes to decide whether you want our Neighbourhood Plan to come into force. If you choose to vote in the referendum, you will be asked:

Do you want South Cambridgeshire District Council to use the neighbourhood plan for Stapleford & Great Shelford to help decide planning applications in the neighbourhood area?

If a majority vote 'yes', our Plan will be adopted and have the same legal status as the Local Plan in all planning decisions.

A majority 'no' vote means that it will be disregarded.

From the Rev Lucinda Howard

THIS will be my last *Messenger* article as I have finished my time as curate and will be moving on to pastures new (and at the time of writing, yet to be decided). I have had three happy, full and meaningful years as curate and before that I was also at St Andrew's as a Ridley Hall ordinand (one year a bit disrupted by Covid). So really five years in total serving in Stapleford and therefore I feel it's appropriate, in my final piece, to reflect on my time here.



To begin with, and I suppose it binds everything else together, is the importance of geographical place. It's often implied in these days of easy international travel and global social network connections, that where you choose to live doesn't really matter anymore. We are supposedly people of everywhere and nowhere simultaneously, however my experience in Stapleford doesn't really bear this out. The Covid restrictions revealed not only our innate need for real in-person relationships, but also the importance of a physical space for gathering and growing community, the strength gained through coming together rather than living apart.

Stapleford is a great place. It retains its own sense of identity despite being close to and sometimes interwoven with, other lovely villages. It defines what I said about being somewhere people come together, adapting to include and welcome those from around the world as well as retaining a sense of continuity for many who have lived here for generations. This is no 'little England' in the restrictive sense but rather a diverse, outward facing community, one concerned with social justice and current issues yet not forgetting that how we treat each other starts with our neighbours.

And you won't be surprised to know that for me as a priest it's also a great example of how a parish should work. For those aware (or interested) in the inner workings of the Church of England, there has long been a concern about the perceived 'decline of the parish' and whether different models of church will eventually take its place. The church I came from was a large, gathered church in the centre of Cambridge and very few people lived in the parish. Ironically, although my family and I continued to live in Cambridge and not in Stapleford, my time at St Andrew's has only strengthened my passion for the parish model - the church embedded in communities big and small, poor and wealthy across the nation and served

by clergy dwelling amongst those they minister to – it just needs to be done well and resourced properly. I hope I don't embarrass him when I say that in Simon, you have a vicar who tries his best to honour this description. To quote the journalist John Hillaby, "Few things are more pleasant than a village graced with a good church, a good priest and a good pub!"

Serving everyone in Stapleford therefore, whether they come to church or not, is key to our ministry. It has been my great privilege over the past years to preside at many of those significant occasions in people's lives, when they're hatched, matched and dispatched or as the church would put it, baptisms, weddings and funerals. This is a part of my job that I love, even the hard service of funerals, because for me it embodies the incarnate message of the Christian faith: that we walk beside people throughout their lives, celebrating with them but also mourning with them too. In the same way I believe Christ shared our full human experience when he was born a man. Jesus understands our hopes and fears, our joy and pain and even our doubts. As The Message translation of the Bible puts it, 'God became flesh and moved into the neighbourhood.'

Two church activities that I have been involved with since the beginning also demonstrate the importance of valuing everyone at every stage of their life, especially the very beginning and the end. Little Fishes toddler group and JOY (for those at the other end of the age spectrum) are groups I have gained as much from as I have ever given out. I have loved being with parents and carers and their pre-school children, to be a support and listening ear, affirming the value of those little ones just as they are, loved and accepted by God before they can do very much at all. And to spend time with those great in years, to learn from their experience and collective wisdom, is also to realise that every one of us will eventually change and grow old, but that God is faithful and doesn't change, he will never grow tired and weary and will prove faithful to the end.

Lastly, whilst I will be immensely sad to leave St Andrew's, I am also grateful to God for all I have learnt during my time here. I've been blessed with colleagues who became friends and know that my ministry as a priest has been strengthened and moulded for the next challenge. I leave encouraged that the church in general is doing OK. In the words of an exatheist writer,

"All churches should be open 24/7. Like hospitals we should consider them a public utility, becoming, for anyone who chances to enter them, a site of refuge, a container for grief, even just a warm place to sit out of the cold." Amen.

Unpacking pockets



POCKETS are useful. More clothes need them. It is an old word for a small bag or pouch in a garment for carrying articles like money. We know of the pocket knife, notebook and puzzles. Neat and handy. Pocket money helps purchasing. Children pocket collections of treasures; conkers, pebbles, sweets, a jig-saw piece, small toys, buttons. Generously sized pockets are special. I remember swishy, swirly skirts with deep lined pockets. Great for hands

when feeling awkward but not practical. Hems can drop unevenly due to weight. My sister had a dress with a gathered pocket attached by ribbon. Unusual and enviable. Once a crisp cotton handkerchief was put in a pocket. Now the paper tissue is favoured. Patch pockets on denim pinafore dresses accept very little, but I like the look. Imaginative pockets forming Advent calendars challenge creativity.

The word can be used differently. In or out of pocket refers to making money sometimes dishonestly when in a position of trust. Pick pocketing is stealing, bringing to mind Oliver Twist by Charles Dickens. Entertaining yet serious. Such crime is often reported by security staff in shops and malls. Mobile 'phones in tight jeans back pockets sadly offer themselves. An attraction to be



avoided. Our earth has pockets of minerals. Mist, fog and rain develops in pockets. A television programme on trees told of ancient pockets of woodland. Trees enhance lives, needing a pocket of respect.

A nursery rhyme, "Ring o' ring of roses, a pocket full of posies," reflects on the sadness of the Plague in 1665. "Sing a song of sixpence, a pocket full of rye" may have been a coded message from legendary Captain Blackbeard. He recruited pirates with whisky made of rye. Agatha Christie wrote a story featuring poison from a yew tree, another 'Pocket Full of Rye.' We need pockets of peace. Stress free moments or spaces. The metaphor of a pocket represents an area of peace within an unhappy environment. Hope leads to peace stemming from the senses. Sight, sound, sensations. Calm gently whispering, revitalising, encouraging. Interest inspires. Music massages minds. Nature nurtures. Pockets of simplicity awaiting discovery. Judith Lee

Neighbourhood Plan referendum: the most important update on our Plan that I'm ever going to write

IN the nearly four years that I have been updating you on progress with the Stapleford & Great Shelford Neighbourhood Plan, this will be my lowest key entry. It is also the most important. By the time you read this, both parish councils will

have entered a pre-referendum period of heightened sensitivity, in which they must exercise caution in making announcements that could influence the outcome of a democratic vote. I am not a councillor but my role as Chair of the Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group – a group formed to produce a plan on behalf of our parish councils – puts me in a difficult position. I will, therefore, stick solely to the facts.

What is a neighbourhood plan?

Neighbourhood planning is a way for communities to take a proactive approach to deciding the future of the places where they live and work. Communities can use a neighbourhood plan to help shape the future development and use of land in their neighbourhood. This includes the development of homes, green spaces, amenities and infrastructure.

Nearly 1,500 neighbourhood plans have so far been adopted in England. Nine of these are in South Cambridgeshire, where a further 17 are at various stages of production.

Stapleford & Great Shelford Neighbourhood Plan is at its final stage

The Stapleford & Great Shelford Neighbourhood Plan has passed independent examination. South Cambridgeshire District Council has agreed that it meets the 'basic conditions' legally required of it and that it can proceed to community referendum. This is the final stage of the neighbourhood plan process, and it is now up to residents to vote in a community referendum on whether you would like the Stapleford & Great Shelford Neighbourhood Plan to come into force.

Arrangements for our community referendum

The referendum is scheduled to take place on **4 September 2025**. Everyone aged 18 and over who is registered and entitled to vote in local elections and lives in either the parish of Stapleford or Great Shelford can vote. Voting may be done in person (with ID), by post or by proxy.

In-person voting will take place between 7am and 10pm at:

- Stapleford residents: Sheltered Housing Communal Building, Cox's Close (off Church St), Stapleford, CB22 5SP
- Great Shelford residents: Memorial Hall, Woollards Lane, Great Shelford, CB22 5LZ.

Look out for your polling card for more details.

A simple yes/no vote

Do you want South Cambridgeshire District Council to use the neighbourhood plan for Stapleford and Great Shelford to help decide planning applications in the neighbourhood area?

If you choose to vote, you will be asked the following question:

You will be able to vote 'yes' or 'no'. If more people vote 'yes' than 'no', then SCDC will adopt the Stapleford & Great Shelford Neighbourhood Plan and it will become part of the development plan for South Cambridgeshire, giving it the same legal status as the Local Plan. Our Neighbourhood Plan will be used when making decisions on all planning applications within our area. If more people vote 'no' than 'yes' in the referendum, then planning applications will be decided without regard to our Neighbourhood Plan.





Did you know, pets can have allergies too?



OUR pets can react to food and environmental allergens just like us, and anyone who owns an allergic pet will know that diagnosis and treatment can be difficult, ongoing, and expensive.


Common allergens include foods, flea saliva, house dust mites, and pollen, and some breeds are more susceptible than others. Reactions to indoor allergens such as house dust mites and flea saliva can be year-round, whilst reactions to outdoor allergens may be seasonal.

Environmental allergens are often responsible for sore, itchy skin, and in some cases, respiratory symptoms. Reactions to food allergens often cause digestive issues such as soft stools and persistent diarrhoea.

A little bit of detective work is used to help find the cause of the allergy, and this will usually happen over several visits to your vet. They will gather a full history of when the allergy occurs, what part of the body it affects, and any changes to the home environment or routine.

The first step is usually to make sure a pet is up to date with effective flea treatment.

Sometimes a short course of oral medication is



enough to get symptoms under control. If the problem is ongoing, your vet may suggest diagnostic tests, such as skins scrapes, cultures, and blood tests, to look for physical evidence of allergens, secondary infections and raised antibodies to different allergens.

Treatment for allergies can include management of your pet's diet and environment, shampoos and topical treatments, probiotics, antibiotics, antihistamines, 'anti-itch' pills and immunotherapy. Many of these treatments will be ongoing, and allergies are often managed rather than cured.

Stapleford Strollers: Walk 139

Rural Essex: a circular walk from Steeple Bumpstead

To get to the start of the walk

TAKE the A1307 to Haverhill. On the by-pass turn right at the fourth roundabout, on to the B1057, signed Steeple Bumpstead. The Fox and Hounds, from which this walk starts, is in Chapel Street (CB9 7DQ)

Distance of walk

4.8 miles and can easily be extended. The walk is better in drier months because it does cross a couple of cropped fields. The scenery en-route is excellent.

OS Map

Explorer map 210, with a minuscule section on map 195. Use your smartphone, or run off a free map extract from maps.the-hug.net. The route map provided should help, too.

Extra Information

Bumpstead means 'the place where reeds grow' but the church doesn't have a steeple. The reference in the place name was to a church a couple of miles to the north east. The Moot Hall, next to the pub, is 16C and was built as a market hall but has, in recent times, been used both as the village library and as the venue for Parish Council meetings.

Route of Walk

From the back of The Fox and Hounds walk down Church Street and turn right on to a path (The Crescent) which meets up with a road. Walk up the steps opposite.

Carry on ahead, walking uphill between fields, until the path turns sharp right to swing round a field. Walk for 100m and turn left to walk along the tree-line. At the end of the field go right, following the tree-line. Turn left on a path next to a large pile of stones. After about 100m turn right and follow the new track until reaching a road.

Cross over and walk along an access road behind a metal gate (waymark arrow) until reaching Garlands Farm. Fork left through the farmyard. At a field, turn right and then swing left next to the tree-line. Just before the field end cross a footbridge, turn right in the next field and, after 100m, go into the field beyond passing a tall waymark. Walk along the field edge to meet a very minor road.

Cross over and pass a waymark sign. Ignore a footbridge but carry on ahead with a ditch to the immediate left. Near the end of the field, turn left



over a metal footbridge and walk ahead with the ditch to the right. After a few minutes enter a wood, at the end of which a road is reached. Turn right, passing a ford, and reach another road.

Cross over and take an uphill path to the right of some houses (footpath sign). Pass a wood to the right. After a footbridge keep ahead and look for another footbridge, on the right. Go over and turn left along the side of a field. The path climbs gently, then swings left and heads toward some trees. Walk to the right of these and carry on past a waymark.

The path now passes to the left of the hedge behind a seat. At the end of the field to the left cross a footbridge, and swing left (ignore the second footbridge). Turn immediate right to walk along the right hand edge of another field. A gap in the hedge at the end of the field leads to a road.

Mill Chase is across and to the right. It is an access road. Immediately before a house is reached, go left following the sign for Wildings Farm. Soon swing right and pass another house. Look for a path across the field on the right beyond the house, just before a gate across the road. The path leads past the left hand side of a house across the field. Walk along it and exit the field via a wooden gate in the right-hand corner.

The path now goes downhill along the edge of a pasture. Exit when the tree-line is reached, going through another wooden gate. The path continues downhill across the middle of a field, then bends right at a copse (waymark post) and enters Steeple Bumpstead. Beyond the field carry on between fences until reaching a road.

Cross over and walk ahead, passing a footpath sign. There is wooden fencing along the left hand side and green chain-link fencing to the right. Immediately after the path swings left turn right, and cross a large grassy area aiming slightly left, for the far left hand corner. Pass the churchyard entrance and exit the grassy area via a path.

This meets a road (Church Street); cross over and turn right to return to The Fox and Hounds. **David Barnes**

Earth Overshoot Day is the point in the year when human demand for materials obtained from nature exceeds what the Earth can naturally regenerate in one year. For 2025, Earth Overshoot Day fell on 24 July, the earliest it has been since the event was first calculated in 2006. RANGEFORD VILLAGES

Stapleford wildflower project

SINCE the Wildflower Project began in 2023, we've learned a great deal about how to support biodiversity here in Stapleford. We've learned more about which wildflower species grow better in different spots around the village and how we can lessen the effects of extreme weather on planting. The project has three main goals: to



encourage local biodiversity by providing food and shelter for pollinators and other wildlife; to support climate resilience, as wildflowers naturally help absorb CO₂; and to bring more colour and beauty to the village.

The 2024 season was a real success, with a wonderful display of colour and all the sites buzzing with biodiversity. The 2025 season brought a few challenges. Unfortunately, two areas were accidentally damaged by different building contractors working in the village, and although they were restored in spring, the dry weather quickly set in and prevented seeds from germinating. Thankfully, a group of Stapleford volunteers stepped in to water these sites, which made a big difference and allowed some wildflowers to establish.

Meanwhile, the Haverhill Road and Recreation Ground sites are thriving, with many wildflowers continuing to flourish (see photos).

Just to note that the wildflower project hasn't cost the village a penny. The displays for 2024 and 2025 were fully funded under a UK Power Networks donation, specifically to support biodiversity in Stapleford.



Looking ahead, the future of the project was discussed at the August Stapleford Parish Council meeting. After considering several options, the decision was made to proceed with an annual seed mix across all areas of the village. This approach will help us keep invasive species like ragwort under control, provide colourful displays, improve resilience against extreme weather, and further boost biodiversity in the village.

Vaccines Update

FLU - this vaccine helps protect against flu, which can be a serious or life-threatening illness. It's offered on the NHS every year in autumn or early winter to people at higher risk of getting seriously ill from flu.

COVID-19 - the Covid-19 vaccine helps protect against Covid-19, which can be a serious or life-threatening illness for some people. It's usually offered on the NHS in early winter to people who need extra protection from Covid-19.

RSV - the RSV vaccine helps protect against Respiratory Syncytial Virus (RSV) that can make babies and older adults seriously ill. This is offered all year round.

SHINGLES - this vaccine helps protect against shingles and is offered all year round. Shingles is a common condition that causes a painful rash. It can sometimes lead to serious problems such as long-lasting pain, hearing loss or blindness. You're more likely to get shingles, and it is more likely to cause serious problems, as you get older or if you have a severely weakened immune system.

PNEUMOCOCCAL (pneumonia) - this vaccine is offered all year round. It helps protect against serious illnesses like pneumonia and meningitis.

Book your flu vaccine with us and when you come in we can check what other vaccines you are eligible for. To book your flu vaccination please call 0300 234 5555 and choose the Granta site of your choice or wait to receive your SMS link via your mobile phone to book your appointment.

Yesteryear

SYLVIA Morris looks at events in the month of August over the years. Punctuation, spelling and capital letters are exactly as printed at the time.

1848

FOWL STEALING. On the night of Monday, the 15th, or early next morning, the hen-house of Mr. John Skinner was broken open and 12 turkeys, 23 ducks, 1 drake, and a large quantity of fowls stolen therefrom.

1888

WEDDING FESTIVITIES. On Tuesday last, the national school of this parish was gaily decorated with flags and flowers by the ladies resident in the village on the occasion of the wedding day of Dr. Collier, who most liberally entertained the children and women to a substantial tea.

1889

HARVEST THANKSGIVING. Harvest thanksgiving services were held here on Sunday last. The church was prettily decorated – indeed the taste displayed would put to blush many larger congregations of greater pretensions. Collections were made for the funds of Addenbrooke's Hospital. Many parishioners regret the discontinuence of the evening service in the village.

1942

AN ENTERPRISING LITTLE BOY. David Holland, six-year-old son of Mrs Holland of Bury Farm Stapleford, collected £2 4s 0d for the Warship Week effort by running a guessing competition. He took his model yacht round the village for people to guess its name, HMS Effort. No-one guessed it.

Many people recall the night of 3rd September 1941 when a Wellington bomber of 57 Squadron based at Feltwell, returning from a raid on Frankfurt, crashed in the parish killing all the crew and demolishing the old vicarage. There is now a commemorative tapestry plaque in Stapleford Church listing their names. "In particular I remember the Wellington bomber that crashed into the old vicarage, and how Mr Cook's two boys were placed on temporary guard in the garden during the day to discourage souvenir hunters." *Patrick Doggett*

1971

"It was reported that the Library in the Johnson Memorial Hall organised by the County Council had been closed as the building was unsuitable to house the books and it was not possible to find an individual to staff it. It

"Drift Road Travellers. Members received a report that the travellers had departed leaving their rubbish behind. Mr Beavis had kindly organised its removal at the instigation of Carter Jonas. Mr Bush had responded with comments on the problem." (From the Parish Council Minutes)




