From the Rev Dr Simon Taylor

SUSIE Dent – Queen of all things dictionary – sometimes puts out a 'word of the day' on social media. It can be an oblique comment on some political event, but today it was a non-political word, 'tandsmør', a Danish word describing bread buttered so thickly you can see tooth marks in it, literal translation 'tooth butter'. She is good fun if you like new words.



Another new word to me last week: 'Orrery'. An orrery is a working model of the sun and planets which can demonstrate day and night, the seasons, phases of the moon and eclipses. They have some in the Whipple Museum of the History of Science, which is where I learnt the word. Well worth a visit. They also have Darwin's microscope – he spent around £3,000 on it in today's money. The star among the orreries is the 'Grand Orrery' made by George Adams. It uses the Julian calendar, not the Gregorian, so must date from before 1752. It is large enough for several people to gather round, and would likely have been used at parties for entertainment and instruction. Orreries were popular at that time, apparently, as was the study of astronomy in general. It was thought both to encourage rational thinking and to inspire contemplation of the divinely-created universe.

That unashamed embrace of both secular/scientific and religious thinking was, for a long time, common and respectable. The introductory pages of Darwin's 'On the Origin of Species' has a quotation from Francis Bacon's 'Advancement of Learning' of 1605 which goes like this.

"To conclude, therefore, let no man out of a weak conceit of sobriety, or an ill-applied moderation, think or maintain, that a man can search too far or be too well studied in the book of God's word, or in the book of God's works; divinity or philosophy; but rather let men endeavour an endless progress or proficience [sic] in both."

It is interesting that Darwin included this quote. It suggests that both science, characterised then as the study of God's works, and theology were important and repaid study. And Bacon is saying more than that, as were the admirers of orreries: the point is that religious and non-religious subjects can and should be studied together, because they contribute the one to the other and have similarities and areas in common as well as obvious differences.

This is not a universally popular view today. The simplistic view of the National Secular Society is that religion is a purely private matter which

should not intrude into education, with the underlying idea that religion and science (and other approved 'secular' subjects) have nothing in common and should be kept determinedly separate. The only 'belief' allowed in that system is theirs, strongly held, namely that everything can be determined by rational inquiry alone, which is plainly false. The politer end of the scientific camp, such as Stephen Jay Gould, say religion and science are separate, non-overlapping magisteria as it is put, different methods of inquiry for studying entirely separate questions. In broad terms, so this line of thought goes, science is about the how things are with a touch of why, and religion is about the different why, of human purpose, meaning and moral values, and these two domains do not and should not meet.

That separation has a lot to commend it, because it allows both camps to remain cordial and to do their own thing. But I do not think it is all that can be said. I have written before about the purpose of a zebra's stripes, a scientific inquiry that goes well beyond mechanistic questions of how things are and why they came about in developmental terms, exploring interactions between different species and numerous what ifs. And from the other direction religion explores much more than just human purposes and mores. I would say that the why of the zebra's stripes and how their function is affected by and matters to humanity, is in part a Christian inquiry, touching on our stewardship of the world, ecology, the effects of climate change on different habitats and societies and so on.

There is something here about not allowing ourselves to be boxed in by the expectations of others. Darwin bought his microscope to study and classify various sub-species of cirrepedia, barnacles to you and me. He did that because back then one way to gain a reputation as a naturalist was to show that you could do the grunt work of classifying a species. He had already essentially formulated his theory of evolution, in the 1820s and 1830s (the voyage of the Beagle started in 1831) but did not publish it until 1859.

You could say that Darwin first went with the flow of societal expectations, then branched out and took his own intellectual course. In freeing himself from those expectations he was doing what St Paul urges, in a way at least: 'Do not conform to the pattern of this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind.'

Paul was a great advocate of our ability to think. He said that we have not been given a spirit of fear and timidity, but of power and love. Elsewhere he urges 'whatever is noble, whatever is right, whatever is pure, whatever is admirable – if anything is excellent or praiseworthy – think about such things.'

Those orreries are admirable, beautifully made, clever and useful. The study of astronomy is noble, for sure. Christians should think about such things. But so too should those who are not Christians think about ultimate things, about purpose, reconciliation, unity and renewal. If you ever wish to contemplate such things without fear of dogmatic or simplistic responses, then St Andrew's is here for you.

HARVEST is a word with strength and confidence. A powerful robust **H.** For farmers it is days of hard work, planning and toil. Weather and seasons setting challenges and moving goal posts. Both erratic through climate change. Experience has taught farmers to become good detectives, as mistakes due to error of judgement prove expensive with profit lost, produce missing from shelves. When successful the job satisfaction must be really gratifying.

Playing with the letters of harvest grows ideas like scattered seeds. Start with earth and heart. In agriculture the land is worked diligently. The passion of the heart firmly behind endeavour. Heat is appreciated. Feeling cold discourages flourishing. Crops dislike it. We eat more. Soup is a popular choice, often vegetable, followed by fruit crumble. Filling, nutritious and satisfying. Yet there are people who don't have enough and starve, with children suffering through lack of food.

Courage might fail once joyful singing of 'We Plough the Fields and Scatter' begins. Later, 'For the Beauty of the Earth' gently reminds us of our own environment. These are riches money cannot buy. We must care for what we have and for each other. **Judith Lee**



What Jesus said to the crowd who were about to stone a woman to death for adultery (but not, incidentally, the man she was caught with) is beside the point. It can only be generalised with caution. It does not mean that wrongdoing should never be pointed out. That would be a peculiar state of affairs.

Pets and fireworks



BONFIRE Night is just around the corner, and whilst most

Vets keen. We receive lots of enquiries from anxious owners about how best they can help their pets during firework season, so thought it might be useful to share our 'top tips.'

Providing your pet with constant access to a secure refuge can be helpful. If your dog is crate trained, cover the crate and provide plenty of soft bedding. Consider adding an item of clothing that carries your scent, especially if your dog is home alone. Mildly anxious dogs might appreciate a Kong filled with treats or liver paste, as licking can be a soothing activity.

Some cats will seek confined dark places under beds and behind sofas. If they retreat when fireworks start, try not to coax them out to comfort them. Allow them to stay put until they choose to come out when the display is over.

Disguise the sights and sounds of fireworks by shutting the curtains and leaving the radio or TV on with the sound turned up. Classic FM usually put together a soothing playlist for pets on Bonfire Night, and there are plenty of other pet friendly soundtracks available online.

Your pet will pick up on your behaviour too, so try and remain calm and cheerful, and avoid reinforcing anxious behaviour. If your pet is comforted sitting on or near you, this is fine but try not to make too much fuss of them when they are scared, instead waiting until they are relaxed and happy and then giving them plenty of praise.



There are a variety of calming supplements and pheromones available which may also benefit your pet, and for pets that are severely anxious, medication can be used with good effect for the short periods around Bonfire Night and New Year's Eve.



Yesteryear

SYLVIA Morris looks at events in the month of November over the years. Punctuation, spelling and capital letters are exactly as printed at the time.

1851

FIRE. On Saturday night, at about eight o'clock, a fire broke out in a cottage occupied by Noah Rollings, caused by the son going into the pantry to draw some beer for supper, where there was some gleaming corn, and it is supposed a spark dropped from the candle on the corn. The fire consumed three cottages, and the greater part of the tenants' furniture: one end cottage was occupied by Dean; the centre one, in which the fire broke out, by the said Rollings, and the other end cottage by another person. The cottages were the property of Mr. Collyer, but whether landlord or tenants were insured, we do not know. Mr Topham, who drives the bus from Shepreth to Cambridge, in connection with the Great Northern Railway, on his arrival at Cambridge about half past nine, informed the agents of the Norwich Union and the Royal Farmers that he saw a large fire burning on his way home, which he thought was the first farm at the entrance to Shelford; and both the Norwich Union and the Royal Farmers got their engines in readiness, and their horses ordered, but there are so many fires now in his district that they wait for an express from the place of fire, unless they know the exact place. It would be very advisable for parties, whether insured or not, being contiguous to where a fire breaks out, to send off at once a messenger to the nearest engine station, as the offices generally that have an engine are always ready to render assistance.

1899

PATRIOTIC FUNDS. A well attended meeting was held on Tuesday evening in the old schoolroom, Stapleford, to consider the best means of helping the wives and families of those soldiers now on active service.

1907

CRICKET CLUB. The annual meeting and supper of the Stapleford Cricket Club was held on Wednesday evening in Mr Hagger's barn. Members turned out in good numbers and a very pleasant evening was spent under the presidency of Mr Councillor Finch. Mr Hagger, secretary, treasurer and captain made a statement as to the healthy condition of the club, financially and otherwise. Eleven matches were played during the season, five were won, five lost and one drawn. Mr T Finch headed the batting averages with 13.5 runs, and Mr W Hoppett the bowling averages with 6.22. Mr Finch was re-elected president, Mr Hagger secretary,

SEWERAGE SCHEME AT STAPLEFORD CAUSES PROTESTS. Fifty householders who live in privately owned houses in Priam's Way, St Andrew's Close and part of Church Street, Stapleford, met to protest against a decision by a sub-committee of the Chesterton Rural District Council to alter the plans of a sewerage scheme involving their properties. In the original scheme the houses would be linked with the main sewer by drains through their back gardens at an individual cost of about £30. But now, it was alleged last night, the council intend to take the sewer underneath the road so that the connecting drains run through the front gardens of the houses. And this, it was claimed, would cost each householder about £140.

Stapleford Strollers: Walk 141

Fore! a circular walk from Sturmer

To get to start of walk

Take the A1307 from Stapleford to Haverhill. Go round the by-pass (A1017) to the far end, then turn right, still on the A1017. The Sturmer village sign will soon be seen and The Red Lion, from which this walk starts, is on the left (CB9 7XF). Despite its name it is painted olive green - well it was in October 2025.

Distance of walk

4.7 miles. It is an undulating walk and takes in part of north Essex and south Suffolk.

OS Explorer map 210. Use your smart phone, print off a free map extract from the-hug.net or use the route map provided.

Extra Information

The name Sturmer comes from 'Stour Mere', mentioned in Domesday Book and is allegedly still visible today to the east of the village. However, the description 'infilled and overgrown' might be more apt. The Red Lion pub dates to the 14C. Haverhill Golf club is interesting, right on the Suffolk/Essex border.; it celebrates its 50th anniversary in 2026 and began life as a municipal pay and play course of nine holes. It became members-only in the early 1980s and was extended to eighteen holes in 1998.

Route of Walk

Begin at The Red Lion, Sturmer (CB9 7XF). Walk up the right hand side of the pub car park (concrete footpath sign) and along a path that leads from the back of the parking area. Shortly afterwards, a wide cross track is met which is the route of an old railway line. Turn right on the track and keep going for about 250 metres until a road is reached. Sturmer station, as was, is opposite.

Turn left along the road for about 100m. Then go right at a footpath sign, where the road swings sharp left. Follow the path along the right hand side of a field. At the end of the tree line to the right, bear slightly left on the same path. At the end of the field carry on ahead over a footbridge and walk ahead on a narrow path with a wire fence to the left. Walk on for about 1½ miles (30 minutes), on the same path, ignoring any side paths left or right keeping the tree line to the right. Eventually, a path heading right will be seen, passing through the tree line via a wooden footbridge. Carry

on ahead for about 100m, then take a path that goes uphill, sharp left, across a large field.

At the end of the field, keep ahead with the hedge line to the left and a fence to the right. Pass some houses (part of the hamlet called Calford Green), cross over a road and carry on straight ahead, to the left of a small green area. Pass some more houses (one is The Old Chapel). Cross a footbridge at the end of the first field, then turn sharp left immediately afterwards and head downhill, with the field to the right and a hedge line to the left.

At the bottom of the slope swing right before the trees and walk with the field on the right until a wide grass pathway is seen through the trees on the left hand side. Take this route through the trees (not signed) and walk for a short distance until the wood ends. Then turn immediate left on another path and keep ahead heading towards a gap in the trees on the near horizon.

After entering the gap and walking through the trees for a short time a cross track is met. Turn left on to it and walk for just over ½ mile until a



NHS Vaccinations

Make sure you are protected this winter

NHS Cambridgeshire & Peterborough are urging anyone eligible for their COVID-19, flu, RSV or pneumococcal vaccines to make sure they have had them this winter. Each vaccine has a slightly different eligibility criteria:

RSV vaccine – for anyone who is pregnant, aged 75-79 or who turned 80 years old from 1 September 2024.

Pneumococcal vaccine – for anyone 65 or over (only one dose is needed).

Flu vaccine – for anyone aged 65 or over (including those who will be 65 by 31 March 2025), have certain long-term health conditions, are pregnant, live in a care home, are the main carer for an older or disabled person, receive a carer's allowance or live with someone who has a weakened immune system.

COVID-19 vaccine – for anyone aged 75+, those aged between six months and 74 years with a weakened immune system because of a health condition or treatment, people who live in a care home for older adults.

Parish Council Chair's report

AT the October Parish Council meeting we were delighted to welcome three new Parish Councillors, Rosie Brown, Juliet Hawksworth and Rebecca Trigg. With one more application pending we will be up to complement for the first time in many years, which is such good news for future work planned in the village. The councillors are all volunteers with other commitments in their lives so a larger number to share the work is very welcome and encouraging.

Thanks were given to Jenny Flynn and the team for their excellent work on the recently adopted Neighbourhood Plan. Implications of this on future planning in the village was discussed.

Because of the cost of work on the pavilion refurbishment, further work is being done on what the urgent concerns are. The toilets are the most obvious pressing concern. There will be a public consultation drop-in session on 22 November from 4 to 8pm in the Pavilion to discuss plans, scale and timing of works and the costs involved.

The tennis club arrangement and multi-use games area (MUGA) use was discussed and it was agreed to explore a new agreement. The MUGA is available for use by groups and individuals other than the members of the tennis club. Please see Stapleford Parish Council website for details on hiring the facility.

Work continues in the cemetery. A wildflower area has been planted in the new part of the cemetery, the gates have been painted and the noticeboard fixed at the entrance. Residents and others are reminded to put rubbish in the correct bins. If the green bin contains any plastic waste it will not be collected.

Tree work is planned in the village, including the cemetery. The Parish Council has an obligation to ensure that trees in the public areas are safe.

Communication was discussed, particularly about advertising village events and avoiding clashes. Strawberry Fields and the Granary will be encouraged to collaborate with this.

The date of the next meeting is Thursday 6 November at 7pm in the Jubilee Pavilion. Members of the public are invited to attend and air their views. **Gillian Pett**




